We also look forward to reopening the Boathouse with expanded outdoor dining space, a dedicated bar, outdoor fireplace and improved rental experience. In the meantime, boat and bike rentals are available during construction at the temporary dock west of the Boathouse (p. 10).

In partnership with the City of St. Louis, Forest Park Forever has restored historic landmarks, including the award-winning Emerson Grand Basin (p. 4), the Boathouse, the World's Fair Pavilion and the Jewel Box. We've also created new spaces designed with and for our community like the Anne O'C. Albrecht Nature Playscape (p. 5) and the Nicholas J. Booker Basketball Courts. And very soon, we'll add the Glade to the growing list of must-see Park amenities and destinations.

Forest Park Long-Term Restoration Project Wins Prestigious Award



A major restoration project that helped define Forest Park's dramatic comeback received the prestigious Landmark Award from the American Society of Landscape Architects (ASLA).

"Restoring the Glory, the Restoration of Forest Park" reflects the lasting impact of the restoration of the central features of the Park connecting Emerson Grand Basin, Art Hill, Post-Dispatch Lake and Government Hill, as envisioned in the Forest Park Master Plan.

Since this project was completed nearly a quarter-century ago with funding from Forest Park Forever donors and the City of St. Louis, these historic features in a previously declining urban park have become must-see destinations for first-time and daily visitors alike.

The awards jury praised the vision, historical connection and cultural relevance of the project: "What a grand vision and grand park. Beautifully done to connect the past to the present. An extraordinary example of guiding the next generation of a historic landscape into the 21st century culture of recreation. The park stands out among the top 10 best urban parks in our country, and this award is a well-deserved honor."

Vast areas of turf grass, several roads and non-native tree species were removed, and the waterway was returned to native riparian and aquatic habitats, while landscape plantings restored the original woodland and prairie habitats. A path system weaves through the area and connects to the Park's dual recreational path system.

HOK, which led the application for this award, was among several St. Louis-based firms that designed these features, which are still highlights of any visit to Forest Park 25 years later.

Five Years of Learning in the Nature Playscape

On June 2, 2021, the Anne O'C. Albrecht Nature Playscape opened to the delight of Forest Park explorers and nature enthusiasts of all ages. Five years later, tens of thousands of native perennials and hundreds of trees thrive, filling the area with vibrant color, providing habitat for dozens of native species and captivating visitors.

In partnership with the City of St. Louis, a national team of design experts, and local leaders and children, Forest Park Forever transformed a 17-acre plot of mowed grass into biologically diverse woodland, wetland and prairie ecosystems. Today, the immersive and innovative Nature Playscape is a beloved natural expanse in the heart of St. Louis. But like nature itself, the Playscape continues to evolve as we learn from people, plants and animals what works well—and what we can make even better.

Building for Visitors, Making Space for Nature

The Nature Playscape's nine distinct activity areas—Mounds, Sensory Garden, Meadow, Spring, Wetland, Gravel Bank, Bottomland Forest, Upland Prairie and Young Forest—mimic some of the natural communities in our region, but they're not "wild." The area is actively maintained by Forest Park Forever's land management and park operations experts to enhance learning opportunities and positive experiences in this urban microcosm of the natural world.

"We are in constant conversation with the space," says Forest Park Forever horticulturist Brenda Walter. "We watch how it changes naturally and through visitors' interactions with it. The ways people enjoy and use the Nature Playscape define how we maintain and improve it."



Learning from People and the Playscape

The Nature Playscape was designed to be a place where visitors feel free to touch, smell and play. Sandy areas, stump steppers, boulders and rocks, and water pumps encourage visitors to interact with the environment, notice how water changes landscapes, feel the different textures of more than 1,500 tons of rocks and boulders and experience the freedom of climbing atop salvaged logs and tree stumps to get a new perspective.

Since the Nature Playscape opened, energetic visitors have continued to teach us how they play in the space, sometimes surprising our team with their ingenuity in rerouting streams or building miniature beaver dams. In response, we have modified some features to better withstand that daily use. This includes lining the water features with pool-style concrete to prevent erosion caused by these little engineers rearranging rocks.

And while the winding paths encourage visitors of all ages and abilities to slow down, meander and appreciate the native landscapes, the inspiring space also invites some to take unexpected routes between activity areas. Early on, visitors began making beelines from one feature to another, creating "desire lines" through the grass. Instead of blocking these now obvious shortcuts, we created mulched cut-throughs to allow people to move naturally through the space.

As the Nature Playscape continues to evolve, it will remain one of the many features that make Forest Park unique among urban parks. This one-of-a-kind experiential area encourages everyone—the young and young-at-heart—to play and interact with nature. The awe-inspiring and fun-filled space provides endless, and sometimes surprising, learning opportunities for visitors and our team. We look forward to many more years of shaping and being shaped by it.



The Return of Ice Skating is Just the Beginning

This winter, we'll enjoy ice skating in Forest Park once again! But the ongoing major construction on the Park's east end is so much more than a renovation of Steinberg Rink. The project is transforming a less-visited area and a limited-use ice rink into a multipurpose attraction that will blend seamlessly into the natural features surrounding it. Designed to harmonize with existing waterways, prairies and woodlands, the Glade will offer 22.5 acres of year-round opportunities for relaxation and recreation.

Imagine a Place for Everyone in Every Season

Skaters. Cyclists. Diners. Nature enthusiasts. First-time visitors. Explorers of every age. The Glade will have something for everyone. It's the only place in the region that will offer ice skating in winter, roller skating and water play in summer and live music, markets, festivals and other community-centered events all year long.

Introducing the Kemper Family Commons

The Kemper Family Commons will be the heart of the renovated facility. Once simply a spot to lace up skates or grab a quick bite, it will now be a hub of activity and comfortable space made for lingering.

The Commons is where visitors will shake off the cold in winter, beat the heat in summer and fuel up for their Forest Park adventures in all seasons. It will be an end point and an entryway to a completely reimagined Forest Park experience.

Introducing the Farr Family Lawn Terrace

The Farr Family Lawn Terrace will be a multipurpose outdoor space at the Glade, designed to allow Park visitors to lounge in a comfortable seating area while keeping an eye on the action. The visually striking but minimalist shade structure that spans the length of Steinberg Rink's west side will provide open and airy protection from the summer sun and serve as a cozy covered space with fire pits in cooler months.

David and Lelia Farr, long-time champions of Forest Park and supporters of Forest Park Forever, have committed a generous lead gift to ensure the Glade is the vibrant, family-friendly destination we've envisioned.

Encouraging Signs of Resilience after Strategic Tornado Cleanup

Forest Park Forever's Land Management team works with the City of St. Louis year-round to care for the landscaped and natural areas in Forest Park's sprawling 1,300 acres. The Park's "Nature Reserve" comprises 172 acres and includes forests, woodlands, savannas, prairies, wetlands and 3.35 nautical miles of waterways.

While not one contiguous stretch of land, the Nature Reserve is interspersed throughout Forest Park. It includes well-known areas—such as the John F. Kennedy Memorial Forest and Savanna, Successional Forest and Klein Prairie—and lesser-known spots near Deer Lake Savanna, the Fish Hatcheries, Round Lake and the woods north of the Glade.

These areas provide varied habitats for resident wildlife and create a critical corridor for birds and insects that migrate through the region. The Nature Reserve also provides beneficial ecosystem services, including rainwater retention and filtration, carbon sequestration, plant pollination and proliferation and erosion control.



Flora and fauna aren't the only ones to benefit. Effective land management and conservation results in naturally beautiful, more stable ecosystems that provide recreational and educational opportunities, including birding, identifying plant and animal species and spending restorative time in nature.

Strategic Tornado Response

Our Nature Reserve team delayed much of the tornado cleanup work in these areas until late fall and early winter of last year to avoid trampling new growth. That meant they had only 16 weeks to work while plants were dormant, birds weren't breeding and other wildlife were hibernating or less active.

The Nature Reserve team hauled an astounding 2.1 million pounds of tree material from the areas they manage. But it's *how* they removed those 1,050 tons of tornado debris that's truly impressive. To reduce damage to healthy plants and prevent soil compaction—which restricts root growth and inhibits water and nutrient infiltration, a deadly combination for these natural communities and a recipe for erosion—they used ground

protection mats: large, heavy-duty, reusable panels that distribute the weight of people and machines to reduce compaction.

They also used a portable capstan winch and line to drag trees and large limbs out of wooded areas and manually pulled out tons of material with heavy-duty chains. Damage from heavy machines typically used for such work would have been catastrophic to the decades-long restoration work in the Park and potentially take centuries to recover from naturally.

This spring, we saw the benefits of that arduous, time-consuming work. Early spring ephemerals showed that the efforts to preserve the soil and vegetation worked, and native flowering species are now flourishing, making the most of increased sunlight shining through the thinned canopy. These always-magical signs of spring and summer are even more meaningful this year, and we have Forest Park Forever's Nature Reserve managers and stewards to thank for protecting them.

Boathouse Renovations on Schedule



The ongoing renovations at the Boathouse are on track to be completed this winter, which will significantly improve the experience for visitors and staff, inside and out.

Inside, additions include a dedicated bar area, increased food production capacity, better acoustics and floor-to-ceiling windows with clear views of Post-Dispatch Lake. Outside, the dock will extend 15 feet farther onto the water, allowing for more space for diners. Other improvements include new shade canopies, an outside bar, a bandstand for live performances and level terrain for full ADA accessibility.

Boat and bike rentals remain available during construction at the temporary dock west of the Boathouse. Big Muddy Adventures is open daily from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., renting kayaks, canoes, standup paddleboards and bikes this summer and fall.

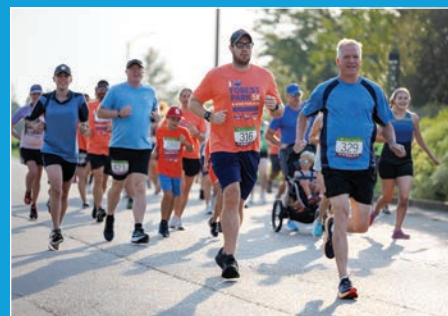

GREEN CARE

Jewel Box Interior Displays

After taking responsibility for the Jewel Box's interior seasonal and permanent displays in 2023 with the help of a contractor, our horticultural team is now directly designing and maintaining these stunning plants from around the world.



Tree Planting

On May 16, Forest Park Forever and the City held a partnership work day, planting 132 more trees as part of ongoing tornado recovery efforts.



MAINTENANCE

Jewel Box Windows

The Jewel Box's sparkle was restored after the City of St. Louis replaced the windows broken in last year's tornado.



Cabanne House Restoration

Cabanne House has been restored, and the City will soon make it available for event rentals again.



Accessible Ramps

Curbs along Wells Drive and McKinley Drive near the Jewel Box have been updated, including repairs to their ADA-compliant ramps.

Lower Muny Lot Repairs

Repairs to the stone retaining wall in the Lower Muny Parking Lot continue, including the addition of drains that will prevent further damage by water runoff from the adjacent hillside.



Damaged Curb Repairs

Damaged curbs in the Hampton roundabout have been repaired.

Repared Paths

The asphalt paths near the fish hatchery, horse stables, greenhouse and Aviation Fields have been repaired or repaved.

The Cascades Repairs

Post-tornado repair work on the Cascades is complete, and the historic falls are flowing again.
